Clifford was a member of the American Jersey Cattle Association. He also mentored many young people over the years, teaching them how to raise dairy cattle and present them in the show ring.

He is survived by a daughter, Amy Buchanan of College Station; a son, Clif (Jana) Buchanan of Navasota; a brother, Calvin (Virginia) Buchanan of Virginia; a sister, Marsha (David) Buchanan-Purdie of Decatur; two grandchildren; a very special friend and companion, Brenda Dyson; and two stepdaughters, Cheri (Derrick) Boyd and their children and Lisa (Jesse) Neaves and their children.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Cheryl, in 2019, and a son, Justin.

He was also a member of First Presbyterian Church of Starkville, where he served several terms as a deacon and elder and was treasurer and chair of the board of deacons too.

Mike worked on the family dairy farm and for Anderson County Sales Company, Chanute Regional Stockyards, Alert Construction, and Beachner Construction.

He joined Ratliff Jerseys, owned by his sister and brother-in-law, Christy and Ron Ratliff, in Garnett in 1992. There, he fed cattle, milked cows, and helped A.I. cattle. He also helped to manage and care for the beef herd, which was used as recipients for elite Jersey embryos. Among his favorite farm activities was baling hay in the summer.

Mike enjoyed the show circuit and was an integral part of the success of Ratliff Jerseys, which won premier breeder and premier exhibitor banners at the All American Jersey Show and the Central National Jersey Show and was named AJCA Master Breeder in 2018. Among his many responsibilities were transport and show ring prep. He played a major role in Ratliff Price Alicia, Excellent-95%, earning three National Grand Champion titles and bred and owned Ratliff D Dean Allie-ET, Excellent-96%, Reserve Winner of the 2006 National Jersey Jug Futurity.

In his free time, Mike traveled to Kansas City to cheer for the Chiefs and watch car races. He also fishing and deer hunting and watching Western movies. He often traveled country roads looking for deer, checking cattle and watching the Brahma cow herd.

Mike had several nicknames, including Red and Crow. Christy called him her bird dog in the last two years of life because he would often find things while driving about and alerting her to things that needed attention.

In addition to his sister and brother-inlaw, he is survived by a son, Bryan Michael Kennedy of California.
